

#### Earn SHS and College Credit for FREE

Upon successful completion (C- or above), one class earns:

- 1 high school credit
- 3 college credits

Earn up to 36 college credits (12 SHS credits) by graduation

- 10th 6 credits
- 11th 6-12 credits
- 12th 6-18 credits

Must complete 6+ credits to study on campus (NSCC Lynn, SSU)

#### Transfer your credits

- Accepted at MA state & community colleges & many other institutions of higher education (C- or above)
- Free Community College for All/ MA State school grants
- Eligible for Masstransfer

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

**Question**: What classes will I take?

<u>Answer</u>: Most classes offered at SHS are general education electives. For example:

- 10th grade-Speech, First-Year Seminar, Ethics (electives)
- 11th grade-ELA (Composition/Foundations of Writing), Social Studies (U.S. History & Government II, Sociology, Psychology), & Gen Ed electives (ART, MDS)

Students eligible to go on campus may opt into more pathway-specific courses

Yes, most colleges accept early college credits, but they have different policies on how the credits are applied. To find out how a specific college will handle your credits, check their admissions and transfer policies online or contact them directly. You will typically need to send an official transcript from the college where you earned the credits to have them evaluated.

#### Factors affecting credit acceptance

- Institution policies: Some colleges, especially private institutions, may have limits
  on the number of credits they accept or might only award elective credit instead of
  specific course credit.
- Public universities: Public universities are more likely to accept early college credits, and states may have programs to ensure credits transfer between state schools.
- Grading: You generally need to earn a "C" or better in your early college courses for the credits to transfer.
- Program requirements: A college may accept the credit as a general education course but still require you to take a certain number of higher-level courses in that subject for your major.
